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



**3. AWARDS AND PRESENTATIONS****3.1 Employee of the Year Presentation – Shelly Booth, Probation Officer, 51<sup>st</sup> District Court**

Court Administrator, Jen Thom and Judge Kuhn, Jr, and Jon Deahl from the Employee Recognition Committee presented Ms. Booth with the Employee of the Year Award. Ms. Booth organized adopting a platoon and soldier's. started a Christmas card campaign to share their gratitude to service people deployed overseas.

Judge Kuhn shared the following.

Shelly started working in the traffic department at the 51<sup>st</sup> District Court in November, 1984 as part of the student co-op program. When she ventured to Michigan State University to pursue her Bachelor of Arts in Criminal Justice she returned to the Court during the summers, working in the Court's criminal department. After graduating from MSU with a Bachelor of Arts in Criminal Justice, Shelly was hired on as a full time employee in 1991. Within four years, Shelly was promoted to the position of Probation Officer, a position in which she has excelled in for over 20 years. Shelly's exceptional capabilities, institutional knowledge and leadership skills earned her promotion to the position of supervisor in January 2017.

During the course of her career in probation, Shelly has continued to grow and educate herself in the field; earning her ARM and CCJP certification through the State of Michigan. Shelly was a major contributor to the development and implementation of the Sobriety Court Program at the 51<sup>st</sup> which just celebrated its 17 year anniversary earlier this month. She helped develop the Community Service Garden at Hess Hathaway Farm which not only provides an opportunity for offenders to give back directly to the community of Waterford, but also provides a bounty of excess vegetables which are donated to organizations that help feed the hungry and those in need.

In addition, Shelly worked tirelessly for the Court's Domestic Violence Program – she was honored by Oakland County, receiving the "Hero Award" for her work with the domestic violence population and caseload.

Over her years with the Court Shelly was also the recipient of the Optimist Club's court employee of the year, Waterford Township's employee of the month and has also been recognized by her peers for her hard work earning 51<sup>st</sup> Court's employee of the quarter.

It seems quite fitting that she be celebrated today with the recognition of Employee of the Year.

The Board offered their congratulations and thanked her for her hard work and dedication.

### 3.2 State Revenue Sharing Presentation by State Representative Jim Tedder

Defined State Revenue Sharing payments are constitutional sharing, guaranteed by the Constitution, distributed to cities, townships and villages on a per capita basis and the statutory piece payments distributed to cities, townships, villages and counties. There have been various changes over the past decade and the amount recipients receive has been reduced. While Constitutional revenue sharing is up it does not make up for the decrease in statutory revenue sharing.

Constitutional revenue sharing payments are estimated, for 2018-2019, \$823 million with \$60 million going to Detroit and the remainder to be distributed to the remainder of the cities, townships and villages.

Statutory revenue sharing payments make up for the lack of taxing authority at local levels.

PA 532 of 1998 created new distribution formulas:

- (1) Unit type of Population
- (2) Inverse Taxable Value
- (3) Yield Equalization

State Revenue sharing in 2001 was \$7.6 million and \$6 million in 2018 not accounting for inflation. In 2011 Statutory Revenue Sharing was replaced with Economic Vitality Program (EVP). Replacing Statutory Revenue Sharing was never repealed and EVP was never codified.

Trustee Thomas asked why 2% of the sales tax goes directly to the schools. Rep. Tedder stated that was how it was proposed when placed on the ballot. He will do more research and report back to the Board.

Trustee Healy stated he is concerned as the board struggles to fund public safety. We have roughly 57 police officers and national averages are 120 police officers. The only reason we have enough firemen is that we have a federal grant along with offering services to the City of Pontiac. In addition, we are trying to figure out if it is possible to repair one road. Trustee Healy stated that citizen's need more control with how their money is being spent. He thanked Rep. Tedder for coming and breaking everything down.

Trustee Joliat asked if the Governor's budget numbers are final. Rep. Tedder stated it was only a proposal and there are some that are not comfortable with the proposal. She thanked Rep. Tedder for the revenue sharing presentation.

Supervisor Wall stated that the Township pays the money that is expected but State and Federal monies come back in increments. Statutory state revenue sharing funds are back to the late 1980's levels and Township staffing levels are back to 1980. Before the bottom fell out of the economy we were on track, in 2018, to receive \$10.7 million in statutory state revenue sharing and we are currently just over \$6 million. That's a \$4 million deficit. Rep. Tedder agreed that the formulas are skewed. Supervisor Wall asked when was the last time these formulas were updated.

Trustee Bartolotta stated that the whole system is broken. As our representative we are asking you to fix it. The state added a 7 cent gas tax and my vehicle registration fees have doubled. It's not fair that the Township has to come up with \$130,000 to fix Walton Blvd.

**5. BOARD LIASON REPORTS (VERBAL)****Trustee Bartolotta**

- The State of Township on February 21<sup>st</sup> was the best he has attended and congratulated Supervisor Wall on a job well done.
- Trustee Bartolotta read at Early Explorers Academy Preschool on Dixie Hwy. He will be going back, with Supervisor Wall, in March for National Reading Month. He invited the other board members to attend and it was a lot of fun.
- On February 20<sup>th</sup> Trustee Bartolotta went to the State Capitol to testify for Senate bills 708, 709, 710, and 741 regarding removing local control over Pit Bull's (Breed Specific Legislation) from the local level. He believes he was able to kill the bills in the committee.

**6. OLD BUSINESS****6.1 Public Hearing on Proposed Crescent Lake Special Assessment District**

Supervisor Wall opened the public hearing for the proposed Crescent Lake Special Assessment District at 6:52 p.m.

Rob Merinsky stated that the current SAD established, by the Board, in 2013. The final treatment will be in 2018. 68% of residents of the total land area signed petitions to approve another SAD to fund the existing program for another 5 years. They would like to work with the same Lake Manager and Contractor. Based on the quotes, annual permit fees and administrative costs the 5 year program would be \$79,530.00 resulting in an annual fee of \$178.72 per property. There are 89 properties in the proposed district. The assessment for the previous program was \$327.00 per property. Notices were published in the Oakland Press on 1/27/17 and 2/10/2018 and notices were mailed per the statutory requirement. After considering all comments during the public hearing on the proposed program the Board has the authority to deny, revise, correct, amend, or change the program, estimate of cost, or special assessment district prior to passing any further resolutions on this matter.

Trustee Bartolotta asked if the last 5 years have helped resolve some of the problems. Rob stated that yes the program is working. He inquired as to why is it so much less expensive this time. Mr. Merinsky stated that the quotes are more in line with the actual costs.

Supervisor Wall stated that once you start treating it is a never ending process.

Trustee Healy asked about why there were multiple petitions circulated. Mr. Merinsky stated that it was a way to decide if there was support for both a Lake Board and Special Assessment District. As they circulated petitions it was shown that people were not in favor of a Lake Board. Trustee Healy has no issue with the SAD. What he doesn't understand is why the people want this Board, who is not knowledgeable about your lake, to make a decision for the requested for this SAD. He recommends taking control of your own lake and setting up a Lake Board.

Trustee Joliat stated that she and Trustee Bartolotta sit on Lake Boards. It's because of Public Act. 188 that they come to the board for approval.

Public Hearing on Proposed Crescent Lake Special Assessment District Continued.

The following residents spoke during the public hearing.

Jim Heinsmer, Lake Board President, the Lake has tremendously approved. They are also embracing the Oakland County initiative with their clean water initiatives to provide devices and training to help with the lakes. Mr. Healy, they only have two mechanisms to fix our lake; the SAD or Lake Board. There was a huge concern and controversial issue with people taking over the management of the lake. They will be educating and working with the lake residents discussing the option of creating a lake board. The cost is down because our people are doing a great job. They are instructed to use the minimal amount of chemicals for the maximum result.

Pat Williams, 4757 Crescent Pointe: she is very much against this SAD. She said that harvesting the lake just had the weeds grow faster. There are less frogs, fish, and turtles are rare and she misses the natural wild life. She doesn't agree with the SAD. Trustee Bartolotta asked if the chemicals are killing the fish and animals. He stated that the other lakes also treat their lakes.

Joe Hoffman, 345 Reymont: He lives on the lake and a canal. He stated the fishing is phenomenal; the lake management company gives a report card with the state of the lake. After 27 years we can actually sit in their "Michigan" room to sit and listen to the frogs and birds. He would love to see it continue.

Patrick Neuman, 4194 Cooley Lake Road: He's lived there 3 years and without the treatment he would not be able to get his boat out. He believes it's safer to have the lake management company to treat the lake vs. everyone doing their own thing. He's very happy with their service.

Gwen Gerald, 4759 Crescent Pointe: She had a question that the assessment was an over an abundance of what they actually charged. The lake has improved. She lives on the lake and she hasn't seen her area being sprayed and she's paying for something she's not receiving. She's been on this lake for 63 years and she would like to see the wild life continue. She's concerned with the long term studies on the chemicals for the lake. Trustee Bartolotta stated that the process is working if there are not the weeds in front of her house. Mr. Merinsky stated that there is a surplus of funds. There is no overlap so when the original SAD is complete we will submit a Resolution, to the board, and request to issue a refund.

Trustee Thomas was asked if the Lake Manager does a water quality test each month. Mr. Merinsky advised the conditions/restrictions tied to each chemical they use. The annual report states the condition and where the treatments will take place.

Supervisor Wall closed the public hearing or the proposed Crescent Lake Special Assessment District at 7:20 p.m.

**7. NEW BUSINESS**

**7.1 Resolution Determining Sufficiency of Petitions and Necessity of Program and Designating Special Assessment District for Eradication or Control of Aquatic Weeds and Plants for Crescent Lake**

The following memo was received from Rob Merinsky, P.E., Director of Development Services.

Upon passing the *Resolution of Tentative Declaration of Intention to Implement an Aquatic Weed and Plant Control Program* for Crescent Lake at the January 22, 2018 Township Board Meeting, the Waterford Township Board of Trustees (the "Board") had declared its intent to initiate the treatment program as presented and to tentatively designate the special assessment district against which the cost of the treatment program is to be assessed in accordance with Act 188 of the Public Acts of 1954, as amended (Act 188).

In addition, the *Resolution of Tentative Declaration of Intention to Implement an Aquatic Weed and Plant Control Program* for Crescent Lake scheduled a public hearing to be held at the Township Board meeting on February 26, 2018 to hear any objections specifically on the petitions, on the proposed treatment program, and on the proposed special assessment district which the cost of the program is to be assessed as directed by Act 188.

The enclosed *Resolution Determining Sufficiency of Petitions and Necessity of Program and Designating Special Assessment District* is enclosed for the Board's benefit if there is a desire to proceed with this request after the conclusion of the public hearing. Note the resolution was prepared under the assumption that this request will move forward as presented. That said, the Board has the authority to deny, revise, correct, amend, or change the program, estimate of cost, or special assessment district prior to passing any further resolutions on this matter.

For informational purposes only, once a *Resolution Determining Sufficiency of Petitions and Necessity of Program and Designating Special Assessment District* is passed, the next step per Act 188 is to establish the assessment roll. The prepared resolution authorizes the Supervisor to prepare this roll and report back to the Board. Notice will be given to each assessed property within the district and a time and place to hear any objections to the proposed assessment roll will be scheduled at an upcoming regularly scheduled Board meeting.

As always, staff will be present for support if called upon.

WHEREAS, a public hearing to hear any objections to the petitions received by Waterford Township, on the proposed program to eradicate and control aquatic weeds and plants in Crescent Lake (the "Program"), and the on special assessment district was held on February 26, 2018, in accordance with the provisions of Act 188, Michigan Public Acts of 1954, as amended (the "Act"); and

WHEREAS, the Board has determined to proceed with the Program.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that:

The Board hereby determines the sufficiency of the petitions on file with the Township Clerk with respect to the Program.

The Board hereby determines the necessity for and determines further to proceed with the Program in the Township.

The estimated total cost of the Program is \$79,530.40 and is broken done annually as follows:

It is hereby determined that the entire cost of the Program shall be assessed against lands in the special assessment district and that the special assessment district's share is in proportion to the benefits to be derived from the Program. The special assessment district's share shall be spread over the special assessment district as hereinafter described.

Resolution Determining Sufficiency of Petitions and Necessity of Program and Designating Special Assessment District for Eradication or Control of Aquatic Weeds and Plants for Crescent Lake Continued.

If at any time during the term of the special assessment district an actual incremental cost increase exceeds the estimate therefore by 10% or more, notice shall be given and a hearing afforded to the record owners of property to be assessed as proved in the Act. The special assessment district shall consist of the parcels described in Exhibit A attached hereto.

The Supervisor is hereby directed to prepare a special assessment roll in which are entered and described all parcels of land to be assessed, with the names of the respective record owners of each parcel, if known, the total amount to be assessed against each parcel of land which amount shall be the relative portion of the whole sum to be levied against all parcels of land in the special assessment district as the benefit to the parcel of land bears to the total benefit to all parcels of land in the special assessment district. The Supervisor is hereby further directed, upon completion of the roll, to affix his certificate to the roll, which certificate shall state that the roll was made pursuant to this resolution and that in making the roll the Supervisor, according to his best judgment, has conformed in all respects to the directions contained in this resolution and the statutes of the State of Michigan, including the Act. The roll shall be filed in the office of the Clerk when it is reported by the Supervisor to the Board. The special assessments shall be payable in annual installments that shall become due at such time as the Board shall hereafter determine.

All resolutions and parts of resolutions insofar as they conflict with the provisions of this resolution shall be and the same are hereby rescinded.

7.2 Resolution Amending Emergency Response Charges

CHARTER TOWNSHIP OF WATERFORD  
OAKLAND COUNTY, MICHIGAN

RESOLUTION AMENDING EMERGENCY RESPONSE CHARGES

RECITALS:

A. Section 14-104 of the Township's Emergency Response Cost Recovery Ordinance in Division 1 of Article III in Chapter 14 of the Waterford Charter Township Code ("Code"), provides that:

The Township Board of Trustees shall, by resolution, adopt a schedule of the charges for wages of personnel, hourly equipment and vehicle use, expendable items at replacement costs, hourly administrative and supervisory expenses, and legal fees, which shall be applied, pro-rata, in the calculation of the expense of an emergency response.

B. By prior Resolution, the Township Board established minimum charges for Basic Life Support (BLS) and Advance Life Support (ALS) Services and mileage charges for Waterford Regional Fire Department emergency response.

C. Attached to this Resolution is a February 6, 2018, Memorandum to the Township Board from the Chief of the Waterford Regional Fire Department, with proposed increases in the minimum charges for ALS and BLS Services and mileage charges that are being recommended for adoption by the Township Board as provided in Section 14-104 of the Ordinance.

**IT IS THEREFORE RESOLVED** that the proposed rates for ALS and BLS Services and mileage charges in the attached Memorandum from the Chief of the Waterford Regional Fire Department are adopted and approved for use as minimum charges that may be used in calculating the expense of an emergency response.

I would like to propose the following changes to the cost recovery tables for EMS transporting services provided by the Waterford Regional Fire Department:

### 7.3 Approval of Rescue Remount Project

The following memo was received from Fire Chief Lyman:

The Fire Department has seven transporting rescues in our fleet. We have been approved for the replacement of one rescue for 2018. We have been in contact with our rescue supplier, Emergency Vehicles Plus in Holland, MI, regarding this purchase. We budgeted \$175,000 for this purchase.

Approval of Rescue Remount Project Continued.

Our contact at EV+ has given us another option to purchase a rescue which involves a remount of the old "EMS box" or patient care area, onto a new chassis. The City of

Cincinnati is one of several fire departments remounting a box up to two times with great success. EV+ will remove the old EMS box, update all lighting to LED, new siren, new door handles, new paint, install our current power load stretcher system, linex compartments and many other updates. The turn-around time is approximately 90 days. We further believe that we can get 2 additional life cycles out of our EMS boxes as well. After researching this option, The Deputy Chief and I agree that this will work for our fire rescues.



The cost for a remount is approximately \$120,000, saving the taxpayers nearly \$55,000. If we are able to remount each of our current seven ambulances two times the savings will be roughly \$770,000.

I am requesting Waterford Township Board approval for the remounting of a fire rescue.

#### 7.4 Approval of Cass Lake Water Storage Tank Rehabilitation

The following memo was received from Russell Williams, Director of Public Works.

February 14<sup>th</sup>, 2018, Sealed bidding was opened for a repainting of the entire wetted interior of the Cass Tank. The original painting contract did not include the wetted interior below the water line due to the good condition of the coatings of a 1992 repaint. Discussion with Kountoupes; awarded of the original repaint and Dixon Engineering, it

was decided that although the coating below the waterline is in a good condition, due to the age of the coatings and the repairs that will be necessary from having equipment on those coatings to complete other repainting of the wetted interior roof, a second contract be bid out to have a complete repaint of the tank inside and out.

The bid results, including both bid alternates, were as follows:

Company Name	Bid Total
Kountoupes Painting	\$145,000.00

After reviewing the bids, Dixon Engineering has formally recommended that the project be awarded to the only bidder, Kountoupes Painting (See Attached Letter from Dixon Engineering).

This project is the result of a Maintenance Inspection and report completed by Dixon Engineering in 2014. A copy of the inspection report, dated August 12, 2014, is included for reference. Also included is a visual rendering of the lettering alternate and the base bid.

Recommended Board Action

1. Award contract to Kountoupes Painting in the amount of \$145,000.00, to perform the specified painting & rehabilitation work of the wetted interior below the water high level line of the Cass Lake Road water storage tank.
2. Amend Water Capital Budget line Item number 59045-97010 with \$145,000.00 from 590 Fund Balance.

**7.5 Citizen to Address the Board – Peggy Simon**

Peggy Simon, 3963 Lakefront Street addressed the board requesting them to consider a single source trash vendor. Ms. Simon provided the following memo to the Township Board.

Waterford trash situation makes no sense. Everyone agrees with that. The Waterford Township Council is the only one that can do something about it.

1. 3 trash trucks per week on our roads are all that are necessary. The current situation is 6 to as many as 16 trucks on our roads, doing 3 to 6 times the damage to our already pitiful Roads!
2. Trash trucks pollute the air and our lakes.
3. Trash truck's fossil fuels contribute to green house gases and burn a non renewable energy source.
4. Trash trucks are a safety hazard. They cannot see small children and animals. Cars often get impatient and go around them without caution.
5. Waterford residents pay twice to 2 1/2 times what municipalities with a single hauler pay. Please refer to the article about South Lyon, having their rates raised to \$35/quarter. Paying half what Waterford residents pay now makes up for the fact the some residents are snowbirds or have very little trash. My husband and I like to be gone often, and compost all kitchen scraps/yard items for our garden and use our own containers when buying, so we have few trash needs, it's just wrong to have all these trucks on our roads.

I ask that you take bids and tell the interested Haulers that residents expect to pay no more than \$40 per quarter for all 3 services. I'm sure the haulers would appreciate the township being a single payer. Make the system very transparent and I'm sure your constituents would appreciate it.

Thank-you, Peggy

She asked the Board to consider requiring the township to transition to a single trash hauler system. Supervisor Wall stated that the Board would not be making any decisions without speaking with the Township Attorney.

Supervisor Wall stated that in 2014 he held a meeting about subdivision streets. 388 people attended this meeting. 7 out of 10 people didn't know the process of getting streets repaired. The trash hauling companies contacted their customers and told them the Township was trying to take away their right to choose a trash hauler.

Ms. Simon asked if the Trustees or Supervisor have the authority to place the Township on a single hauler trash hauler. Supervisor Wall stated yes, the Township Board, has the authority. She's glad to hear that they have power to do so and thanked the Board for their time.

## 7.6 PUBLIC COMMENTS

**Mark Leopold, 4717, Motorway**  
**Ed McArdle, 5936 King James Lane**

Mr. Leopold recently moved from Melvindale. He found it was bizarre that everyone contracted their own trash haulers. He thought that if we acted as a city (Township) it would save the residents money and help the environment too.

**David Weyhing, 6192 Adams Dr**

He likes having the option to choose the cheapest company. He hopes the Board lets the people have the right to choose.

**Lynn Rafferty, 320 Loberta Lane**

She pays just under \$300/year in trash removal. If she had to pay for road repairs (SAD) in addition to her trash payment it would be a hardship for her. Also, a single hauler trash system would help the environment by not having as many trucks on the road.

**Sharron Mackovich, 3749 Lakefront St**

She would like to see consolidation within the township to have cost reduction and the option to recycle.

**Carl Aavik, 957 Staton dr**

He supports moving to a single hauler. One trash hauler, once a week, would be better than 7 trucks coming through individually.

**Crystal Nassouri, 1408 Rossdale Dr.**

She supports a single hauler trash hauler.

**Norm, 1385 Denver**

He supports the idea of a single hauler trash hauler. He came from Commerce Twp and paid \$110 a year and it covered his trash removal and snow plow.

**Rob Elliot, 5286 Cooley Lake Road**

He supports a single hauler trash hauler. He inquired how to make it happen. Supervisor Wall stated that he will contact Legal Council before he makes any comments.

**Nancy Hendricks, 1513 Ridgemont**

She supports a single trash hauler. She stated that we can do better. She asked "how do we know you are doing anything about it?" Supervisor Wall stated that they will discuss it at a Township Board work session which is an open meeting. To implement a single trash hauler system it would go before the board as an introduction and then be adopted or rejected at a second meeting after the proper publications and meeting notices.

**Jacquelyn Brown, 945 Oregon Blvd**

She agrees with a single hauler trash system.

**Pat Thomas, 2957 Elsanor Dr.**

She is curious where these people were in 2014 when people came forward stating they wanted to choose their own trash hauler. She would like the opportunity to choose her own trash hauler.

Trustee Bartolotta stated that the original meeting was for street improvements and not trash haulers.

**Tom Bissett, 1071 Meadowlark**

In Clawson they have their own, single hauler, trash system. He imagines that a lot of businesses would be in favor of a single hauler as their trash gets abused. He works for the State of Michigan Parks system and sees people throwing their trash away at parks system. He imagines that people are also throwing trash away in business' trash containers.

**Donna Wall, 3450 Alco Drive**

Back in 2014 the trash haulers that collect in Waterford organized residents to attend the road information meeting. They were very disrespectful. If this goes forward the residents in favor of single trash hauler, you need to be here as this will be a fight like you've never seen.

**Rob Church, 1397 Oklahoma**

He is in support of a single trash hauler for three reasons; quality of roads, large trucks on the road with no subdivision sidewalks for kids, and reduced costs.

Trustee Bartolotta stated that he is listening to the comments and hears what you are saying. He agrees that they need to move to a single trash hauler. He brought up the idea of a single day trash pickup but that didn't go anywhere. We need to do something now. We need to talk with our Attorney and have a Town Hall meeting. If you are asking for me to put this on the agenda I am willing to do so but I need more than 10 people to come to me.

Trustee Joliat appreciated all of the comments. We need to look, as a township board, what we can control to save the infrastructure we have.

Supervisor Wall since 2014, Peggy Simon is the 1<sup>st</sup> person serious person to come and address the single trash hauler. In 1998 a single trash hauler was voted down and the roads are 20 years worse. 1. Single Source Trash hauler would allow you to take the savings to put towards a SAD for road repairs. 2. Fewer trucks on the roads is safer for the community. Thank you for coming out tonight. I take everything everyone says seriously. It's good to see residents interested in preserving the roads, the environment and their community. If the board chose to move forward with a single trash haulers system it would have to go out for bids so that all companies are bidding the same thing.


