

Naturalization Records



- Naturalization Generally a Two Step Process
 - Took a Minimum of 5 Years
 - After Residing in the U.S. for 2 Years
 - Could File a "Declaration of Intent"
 - » "First Papers"
 - After 3 Additional Years
 - "Petition for Naturalization."
 - When the Petition was Granted
 - A Certificate of Citizenship Was Issued

Naturalization Records



- Exceptions to Two Step Process
 - **First Major Exception**
 - "Derivative" Citizenship was Granted to Wives and Minor Children of Naturalized Men Between 1790 to 1922
 - Wives of Naturalized Men Automatically Became Citizens.
 - Alien Women who Married a U.S. Citizen Automatically Became a Citizen
 - Conversely, an American Woman who Married an Alien Lost her U.S. Citizenship, Even if She Never Left the United States

Naturalization Records



- Exceptions to Two Step Process
 - **First Major Exception**
 - "Derivative" Citizenship was Granted to Wives and Minor Children of Naturalized Men Between 1790 to 1922
 - **From 1790 to 1940** Children Under the Age of 21 Automatically Became Citizens Upon the Naturalization of their Father
 - » Little or No Documentation for Wives & Children Included in Declarations or Petitions Filed Before September 1906

Naturalization Records



- Exceptions to Two Step Process
 - **Second Major Exception**
 - **From 1824 to 1906** Minor Aliens who had Lived in the United States 5 Years Before their 23rd Birthday could File Both their Declarations and Petitions at the Same Time

Naturalization Records



- Exceptions to Two Step Process
 - **Third Major Exception**
 - For Veterans
 - 1862 Law Allowed Honorably Discharged Army Veterans to Petitions After 1 Year of Residence & Without First Papers
 - 1894 Law Extended this to Navy & Marines After 5 Years Service
 - 1918 Law Allowed WWI Veterans to File Petitions
 - Laws in 1919, 1926, 1940 & 1952 Extended Preferential Treatment

Naturalization Records



- Two Main Records Categories
 - Records Prior to 27 September 1906
 - Local Courts & Federal Courts
 - Information Varies
 - Few Clues
 - Since 27 September 1906
 - Federal Courts
 - Uniform Information
 - Useful

Naturalization Records



- Most pre-1906 naturalization papers contain little information of biographical or genealogical value
- No standardized forms
- Federal, state, county & local courts created their own documents
 - Varied greatly in format
 - Wonderful exceptions can be found so it is worth seeking pre-1906 naturalizations

Naturalization Records



- Post-1906 Petitions May Include
 - Name of individual
 - Current address
 - Occupation
 - Birth date or age
 - Birthplace
 - Physical description – complexion, eye and hair color, height, weight, visible distinctive marks
 - Current and former citizenship
 - Marital status

Naturalization Records



- Post-1906 Petitions May Include
 - If married, marriage and spouse information
 - name of spouse
 - marriage date
 - marriage place
 - birthplace and date of spouse
 - date and place of spouse's entrance to the U.S.
 - current residence of spouse
 - whether the spouse was a naturalized citizen and if yes, where and when naturalized
 - Children
 - number born to the individual
 - and/or their names and ages
 - Where and when lawful admission for permanent residence in the U.S. took place

Naturalization Records



- Post-1906 Petitions May Include
 - Date of Intention
 - Immigration info – date of immigration, country from which immigrated, last foreign residence, port and mode of entry, name of ship, date of entry
 - Length of time in the U.S.
 - Last foreign residence
 - Date of Petition
 - Photograph

Naturalization Records



- Locating Records
 - Check with Local Court House
 - Employees May Not Realize They Have Older Records

- Take Care When Recording Place Names (Avoid Confusion)
 - Include ALL Parts of the Location
 - Good Genealogy Database Programs Make Provisions
 - E.g.: Windsor, Essex Co., Ontario, Canada







Lesson: People who said they were from Czechoslovakia after 1918 used the name of the new country. Before WWI they were part of the Austro-Hungarian Empire and probably said they were from A-H or either Austria or Hungary. They may have also said they were from Bohemia. Place of origin was always entered in the records as the then current name of the place.

–Draft Records

•**First Registration.** The registration on 5 June 1917, was for men aged twenty-one to thirty-one—men born between 6 June 1886 and 5 June 1896.

Military Records



•First World War

–Draft Records

•**Second Registration.** The registration on 5 June 1918, was for men who had turned twenty-one years of age since the previous registration—men born between 6 June 1896 and 5 June 1897. Men who had not previously registered and were not already in the military also registered. In addition, a supplemental registration on 24 August 1918, was for men who turned twenty-one years of age since 5 June 1918.

•**Third Registration.** The registration on 12 Sept 1918, was for men aged eighteen to twenty-one and thirty-one to forty-five—men born between 11 Sept 1872 and 12 Sept 1900.



This database is an indexed collection of World War II U.S. draft cards from the Fourth Registration, the only registration currently available to the public (the other registrations are not available due to privacy laws). The Fourth Registration, often referred to as the "old man's registration", was conducted on 27 April 1942 and registered men born on or between 28 April 1877 and 16 February 1897 - men who were between 45 and 64 years old - and who were not already in the military.

Military Records

 - Information available on the draft cards includes:
 - Name of registrant
 - Age
 - Birth date
 - Birthplace
 - Residence
 - Employer information
 - Name and address of person who would always know the registrants whereabouts
 - Physical description of registrant (race, height, weight, eye and hair colors, complexion)

 - Records of the National Archives and Records Administration, Record Group 64; National Archives at College Park, College Park, MD.
 - Contains information on about 8.3 million men and women who enlisted in the U.S. Army
 - Incomplete and does not represent the entirety of the U.S. Army servicemen

Land Records:
Information Sources



- Place of Residence

Can help differentiate between two men of the same name in different localities at the same time. Many white men owned land before the Civil War, so, if no reference to ownership in a rural area can be found, the individual may not have lived in that area

Information Sources



- Former Residence or Other Residence

Potential place of birth, marriage, or other land purchases

Land Records:
Information Sources



- Names

Ascertain a widow's or wife's given name.

Land Records:
Information Source



- Religion

The word *jurat* following the name of a witness indicates that the witness swore an oath. Witnesses who "affirmed the deed" were Quakers
This provides another clue and suggests new research avenues

Land Records:
Information Sources



- Dates of Transaction and Recording

Indicates a period of residence in an area and clues to individuals' arrival and departure dates. Could imply an approximate or actual death date of a landowner.

Land Records: Information Sources



- Description of the Parcel or Lot

If a property description given in the early 1700s still exists in the family in the late 1800s, it could prove line of descent even though no written deed was located.

Land Records: Information Sources



- Price or Consideration or Circumstances of the Transfer

Could indicate a special relationship, such as “for love and affection” or “For the price of an orange blossom branch on [a specific date].”

Land Records: Information Sources



- Power of Attorney

May lead to other places of residence

Land Records: Information Sources



- Relationships

Could identify groups of people with the same surname. A female listed first in a deed often indicates the woman is a widow and the male following is her son. This was common practice in many areas.

Land Records: Information Sources



- Approximate Dates

Could indicate the approximate or actual death date of a landowner. In some states, men could not sell land until a certain age; in some situations this can help establish approximate birth dates.

Land Records: Information Sources



- Military Service

Terms such as *Col.*, *Cpt.*, *Lieutenant*, etc., might indicate membership in a local or state militia unit.

Information Sources** 

- Social Standing in the Community, Titles, Occupation, or Education

Terms such as *Mr., Esq., yeoman, farmer, merchant, etc.*, and a signature (versus a mark, as X) may distinguish one individual of the same name from another.





- Genealogy is Scientific-- It Can be Replicated

CITATIONS: WHY?

- Effective Source Citation is an *Art*, not a *Science*
 - No Formula can Cover All Situations that Researchers Encounter
 - Researchers Need to Understand the Reasoning that Underlies the Suggested Formats so you can Devise Sound Citations to Fit your Particular Circumstances

GUIDELINES FOR DOCUMENTATION

- Any Statement of Fact that is Not Common Knowledge Must Carry Its Own Individual Statement of Source

GUIDELINES FOR DOCUMENTATION

- Source Notes have Two Purposes
 - To Record the Specific Location of Each Piece of Data
 - To Record Details that Affect the Use or Evaluation of that Data

GUIDELINES FOR DOCUMENTATION

- Sources are Tracked in Two Basic Ways
 - Generic Lists (Bibliographies)
 - Source Notes Keyed to Specific Facts

GUIDELINES FOR DOCUMENTATION

- Source Notes have Two Basic Formats
 - Full Citations
 - Short Citations

GUIDELINES FOR DOCUMENTATION

- Source Notes for Narrative Accounts can be Presented in Four Ways
 - Footnotes
 - Endnotes
 - Parenthetical Citations
 - Hypertext

GUIDELINES FOR DOCUMENTATION

- Source Notes Keyed to Narrative Text Should be Numbered Consecutively
 - The Corresponding Numbers Should Appear in Correct Sequence Within the Text

GUIDELINES FOR DOCUMENTATION

- Explicit Source Notes Should Appear on
 - Pedigree Charts
 - Family Group Sheets
 - Family Histories
 - Research Reports
 - Individual Subject Reports

GUIDELINES FOR DOCUMENTATION

- Do Not Cite Sources You Have Not Used
 - It is Both Risky and Unethical to "Borrow Notes" from Another Work

GUIDELINES FOR DOCUMENTATION

- Microforms and Electronic Materials Need Extra Treatment

- Clear Citations Require Attention to Many Details





 - Date (Posted, Updated, or Accessed)
 - Citation Detail (Page, Section, Paragraph, Keywords, Entry, etc.)



Brick-Wall Busting Techniques



- We All have Brick-Walls
- Make a list of everything you really know
 - You will need to revisit all your associated records to do this
 - You may have missed a tiny snippet of information that could be the key to the puzzle
 - Don't be afraid to throw out family legends

Brick-Wall Busting Techniques



- Review All Your Documents
 - Carefully Read & Re-read those Documents
 - Compare Documents to those of Other Family Members such as Siblings, Aunts & Uncles
 - Look for Discrepancies
 - Look for New or Additional Facts

Brick-Wall Busting Techniques



- Determine what it is you really need to know
 - Are you looking for the right information to help you move to the next step?

Brick-Wall Busting Techniques



- Where are the logical places to look for that information
 - Use guidebooks (such as the LDS resource guides available at www.familysearch.org) to educate yourself on what is available
 - Check all available sources and record when you DON'T find something as well as when you do
 - Don't assume that people are dead just because they are missing. Making sure you have exhausted all avenues before making assumptions

Brick-Wall Busting Techniques



- Get creative with spellings
 - Try common misspellings or phonetic spellings
 - Try wildcard * ? searches on computerized searches (* = anything, ? = replaces one character only)

Brick-Wall Busting Techniques



- Try following other people – **FAN** (Friends, Ancestors & Neighbors)
 - What about his/her siblings?
 - What about their traveling companions or neighbors?
 - Are there any clues in traditional naming patterns or middle names?
 - Who are the witnesses to an event?
 - Who are the neighbors/boarders?

Brick-Wall Busting Techniques

- Try following their land rather than the people
 - If they are landowners follow the plot or find the same address on a census record

Brick-Wall Busting Techniques

- Create Comparative Census Abstracts
 - Compare Different Families in Same Census
 - Compare “Same” Family in Different Censuses
 - Compare Specific Questions Concerning the Same Family in Different Censuses

- Create Comparative Census Abstracts
- Question: Is This the Same Family?

Brick-Wall Busting Techniques

- Create A Timeline
 - Record Known Details
 - Seek Corroborating Evidence for Record Discrepancies
 - Broaden Research to Include Collateral Relatives
 - Formulate Research Goals
 - Research New Unused Sources
- Timelines Help Clarify What You Know & What You DO NOT Know About an Individual

Brick-Wall Busting Techniques: Genealogical Profiling

- Problem Ancestor Type: **BLACK SHEEP**
 - The proverbial skeleton in the closet -- a convict, outlaw, madam, pirate or other "colorful" character
- Suggested Sources
 - Censuses (check occupation field)
 - Coroner and funeral home records
 - Court records
 - FBI, prison and institutional records
 - Marriage and divorce records
 - Message boards
 - Newspapers and obituaries

Brick-Wall Busting Techniques:
Genealogical Profiling



- Problem Ancestor Type: **CENSUS EVADER**
 - This individual or family makes an appearance in certain federal enumerations but not others
- Suggested Sources
 - City directories
 - Soundex indexes to 1880 and later censuses
 - Census searches by first name only and/or demographic characteristics
 - State and territorial censuses
 - Tax lists

Brick-Wall Busting Techniques:
Genealogical Profiling



- Problem Ancestor Type: **DRIFTER**
 - Moves around more than a band of gypsies. Shows up in different states and localities; never seems to stay put for an extended period
- Suggested Sources
 - Censuses (check birthplace fields)
 - City directories
 - Deeds and land records
 - Migration and boundary-change maps
 - Social histories

Brick-Wall Busting Techniques:
Genealogical Profiling



- Problem Ancestor Type: **FLEETING FEMALE**
 - She might be the mother whose maiden name eludes you, or the daughter whose marriage you can't pin down
- Suggested Sources
 - Court records
 - Convent records
 - Marriage and divorce records
 - Military pension files
 - Naturalization papers
 - Newspaper society pages
 - Records of her husband and siblings

Brick-Wall Busting Techniques:
Genealogical Profiling



- Problem Ancestor Type: **MYSTERY IMMIGRANT**
 - Your missing link to the old country. You might know approximately when he came, but can't retrace his journey or pinpoint his town of origin
- Suggested Sources
 - Alien registrations
 - Censuses (check birthplace and language fields)
 - Censuses (check neighbors born in same country)
 - Church records
 - Emigration lists
 - Ethnic newspapers
 - Naturalization papers
 - Newspapers' ship arrival notices
 - Passenger arrival lists

Brick-Wall Busting Techniques:
Genealogical Profiling



- Problem Ancestor Type: **ORPHAN OR ADOPTEE**
 - Seemingly, the ultimate brick wall, since the parents' identities may be unknown or purposely concealed
- Suggested Sources
 - Amended or delayed birth certificates
 - Apprenticeships
 - Censuses
 - Family interviews
 - Guardianships and orphans court records
 - Message boards and support groups
 - Newspaper adoption notices
 - Orphan train records
 - Orphanage records
